EFRC Rescues Eight Former Circus Cats From Cramped and Dirty Conditions

On a snowy morning in February a call came in from the USDA asking us to take 5 tigers, 3 lions and assist in the removal of two more exotic felines and the question "can you do that today?" Ten big cats in dirty, rusted old circus carts locked in a barn in northern Indiana were to be confiscated. Being one of the only organizations in the country capable of taking 10 large predators with no advance notice we headed north, crawling through a blinding snow storm at 15 mph arriving at the rendezvous point late. There we were met by a large turnout of federal and state officials and promptly escorted to the site.

Federal and state agents kept the owner at a distance as we surveyed the situation with USDA officials and our staff began unloading three truckloads of equipment. Some of the animals loaded readily. One lion required immobilization and another had to be taken in her cage, afraid of leaving the tightly confined space (about 7' square) where she had always been kept.

By dark all of the cats were loaded and on their way to a new and better life. The day after their arrival all of the animals were examined by Dr. Fred Froderman. our veterinarian. We then scheduled a procedure for the following morning for Princess who had two claws grown back into her pad and caused difficulty

walking.

Samo, one of the male tigers, was missing large portions of his coat and had sores and lacerations on both of his legs and tail. Sanitation, antibiotics, proper diet and a large enclosure have provided Samo with a chance to recover.

The first cats to be put in permanent cages were Zeus and Thor, two male lions who were barely able to walk. After being in their enclosure for a month they ran for the first time, although not very well. All of the animals are now out in bigger enclosures.

All of these animals have made an amazing transformation and are doing well. We are often highly critical of the USDA-APHIS policies and actions concerning the welfare of big cats. This time however, we were gratified by a large and determined APHIS presence.

New (and familiar) Cats, New Homes

The last several months have seen the completion, construction and renovation of may enclosures. Permanent enclosures have been constructed and occupied by all of the Oklahoma cats.

After years of construction "The Eights" new enclosure featuring our first large concrete pond was completed and the tigers moved in. Their old cage underwent extensive renovation and JB, TJ and Tank moved there from a smaller cage. That cage in turn was upgraded for Thor and Zeus (new male lions).

Tahoe and Raja Girl, tigers from northern Indiana, were moved to a larger and nicer enclosure and their old cage was substantially upgraded for Simba (another new lion).

Sampson III's first dental appointment is scheduled for June 8th. This is the first of several steps needed before cataract surgery can be performed to restore his sight (see Sampson III in Cat Tales December 2009).
