Six new cats since Christmas

Christmas Cats: On the cold Christmas eve morning we found ourselves in a snowy field in central Illinois looking at 2 very nervous tigers. The 1 1/2 year old siblings had somehow made their way from Biloxi, Mississippi. Illinois, however, does not allow people to keep tigers and we were told Christmas was the deadline for their leaving. Despite the large mesh size of the fencing we were able to pole syringe the larger male but that made his littermate more apprehensive. When she stopped pacing we were able to dart her.

Fifteen minutes later with both cats safely sedated we were able to start the loading process. First we assessed the level of sedation then both were examined, vaccinated, given warm fluids then car-

ried to the truck and placed in transport cages. Our veterinarian then reversed the anesthetic drugs and we were on our way home.

They spent Christmas day in the meat building and the next day they were moved into their new enclosure. Now that they have been here four months they are shifting and are much calmer around the keepers. New people and things like the lawn mower stress them a great deal. It is doubtful that they will ever be in the public area.

Valentines Day Cats: Looking for love on Valentines Day? It came here in the form of three tigers brought by our friends from In-Sync Exotics. The three came from a "less than ideal" home in Huston. Two 4 year old brother and sister, Krixis and Kadira, had eyelid problems (see following story under veterinary care). The third, Gaia, a two year old female was very friendly. Over the first few days the girls explored their large new home. Krixis was slower to come out but within two weeks all three were hiding in the trees and climbing to the top of their tower.



Cosmo serval:

Cosmo, a seven year old serval arrived here in the pouring rain on March 9th. The rain would have been reason enough to put him in a transport cage in the clinic but he also had a large collar. There are many things that can get caught in a collar and injure the cat so Cosmo stayed inside until the veterinarian got here to sedate him. The collar was removed, he had a through exam, blood was drawn. Then Cosmo woke up in his new home collar free.

He came here from the Valparaiso area where was used to breed savannah cats (mix of a serval and domestic).

Ophthalmology Surgery

Two of the three Texas tigers, Krixis and Kadira, arrived at the EFRC with inverted eyelids. Upon arrival it was very obvious that Krixis's condition was much worse than his sister and that he was in pain. It was also obvious that Kadira was in overall good health but suffered from a milder eyelid condition.

Upon examination by Dr. Froderman plans were set in motion to get an ophthalmology consultation and arrange for surgery on both cats. Dr. Froderman contacted Dr. Heidi Klein at IndyVet and a surgery date was set.


On April 3rd Dr. Klein arrived with two of her techs and a lot of specialized equipment to provide the surgery for these two cats. The surgery team also included Dr. Froderman and Dr. White for the initial immobilization, anesthesia and monitoring.



Surgery Summary

They both had a defect in their upper central eyelid margin. The eyelid margin is a unique structure where the eyelid skin and the pink inner lining of the eyelid (conjunctiva) meet. This lack of eyelid margin was causing hairs to rub on their corneas (front of the eye) and causing exposure. To surgically correct this abnormality, I removed the abnormal lid without a margin by taking a wedge of tissue. I sutured the 2 edges together to create a normal eyelid margin. This restored the normal function of the eyelid and protected eye from hairs touching it. Because they are siblings with the same defect on both eyelids, I suspect this is a congenital problem (one they were

born with) and is likely genetic.



Additionally on Krixis, we removed a crescent shape of skin below the eye to help roll out an eyelid that was rolling in (entropion).







New Habitats, Updates and Renovations

Upgrades and improvement are on going at the EFRC on a daily basis, working on climbing towers, boxes, rebuilds and new construction.

- We have rebuilt 4 enclosure on the main tour more than doubling the size for Cash and Diamond. Beaux and Rocky have moved from the field area into large freshly remolded enclosures where visitors will be able to see them for the first time.
- We have finished one new habitat rich enclosure in the back of the field which houses the 3 Houston cats who arrived on Valentines Day.
- A new perimeter fence under construction will enclose several more acres.
- We have substantially rebuilt two more enclosures one that has Tiger Lily and another not yet occupied.
